The Archive

The EPA Community Archive will have two distinct types of collections—digital and physical archives.

The digital archive will consist of oral histories (video and audio recordings), digitized materials and exhibitions that are accessible on our website and social media.

The physical archive will consist of tangible materials and artifacts located at sites throughout the community, exhibitions highlighting important stories and events, and historical markers to officially recognize places of Importance to EPA residents.

The Nairobi Schools/Nairobi College

The Nairobi Schools, founded by Gertrude Wilks, was comprised of Nairobi Day School and Nairobi High School. Nairobi College, founded by Bob Hoover, was a private community college. Thus, during the Nairobi Movement (1960 – 1985), independent schools from preschool through community college were created for Black youth in East Palo Alto.

Process, Progress and Programs



EPACA is being built by and for the community over three phases:

Phase 1 October 2020 -January 2021

Gathered broad community input on how to develop and structure the archive through an online survey, focus groups and individual interviews.

Phase 2 February 2021 - June 2022

Designed the physical archive, collected virtual + physical archival materials, conducted oral histories and developed a marketing strategy, governance structure and five-year business plan.

Phase 3 July 2022 December 2025

Begin functioning as an independent nonprofit, hire staff, expand collections and programming, acquire headquarters/museum site and implement a growth strategy to raise funds that will sustain the archive.

We're now in our third phase, establishing and offering a dynamic mix of programming for people of all ages and backgrounds, including:

Celebrations and Festivals: Annual programming to honor and celebrate the heritage months and cultural festivals of our diverse racial/ethnic communities.

Field Building: Regional activities to promote community archive field building in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Community Education: Community forums, guided tours, historical sites and landmark designations that feature key people, organizations, places and events in EPA's history.

Intergenerational School Programs: Collaborative programming to develop curriculum for in-school and after school activities in public, charter and private schools.

Living Arts: Visual, performing and street art events featuring local artists.

Self-Archiving: Training and technical support to help community members document their stories and contribute to the virtual and physical archives.
